

## PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

*"Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words."* – Romans 8:26.

For most of my life, my powerful voice has been one of my most defining characteristics. It began when I was the Drum Major of our high school's marching band, shouting over the drums and brass sections during our halftime shows during Saturday afternoon football games. It continued in both university and seminary, when I joined our school choirs and sang in many concerts both on campus and in tours of the northeastern United States. When I began to lead worship in our seminary chapel and during my internship at Bethel Lutheran Church in Jamestown, New York, I began to appreciate how my voice would be an asset in preaching and worship leadership. My voice has served me well over the years as a pastor, as a member of several community choruses, and in my recent foray into community theatre. I am still well-known as "the tall pastor with the big voice."




But last month, my normally reliable voice began to fail. I caught the nasty cold virus that has been going around the area, one of the worst and most long-lasting colds I've ever experienced. In addition to the usual cough and cold symptoms, it began to affect my voice. At first, it was my singing voice that suffered; I had trouble hitting the high notes, and before long I couldn't produce any good sounds in any range. The cold then went after my speaking voice; if you were in worship on Sunday, March 5, you might have thought that I was resurrecting my Lurch character from *The Addams Family* – but sadly, that was all the voice I had that morning. The voice that was so reliable and useful in my life and ministry had failed me; to say that I was frustrated would have been an understatement.

My voice is slowly returning, but this ordeal has taught me to appreciate the gift of my voice and to make certain I take good care of this asset that is so useful to me in so many aspects of my life. It has also been an occasion in which I have thought of what it means to be voiceless – not only in the physical sense, but those situations in which we cannot find our voice, cannot find the words

that seem appropriate to what we are experiencing. It may be when a member of our family has died, and we can't find the words to express our grief with one another. It may be a situation in which someone comes to us for advice, and we don't know what words will be most helpful. It may be a time when someone asks us to pray for them, and for some reason we can't summon the words or find a voice to bring before God the petition that will bring them comfort and peace.

Our voices may fail us; we may not find the words to express what is in our hearts. It is in these moments of weakness, these occasions of voicelessness, that we turn to the one who gives voice to our deepest thoughts and emotions. In his letter to the Romans (which we have been studying in our Monday evening Bible Study class), St. Paul reminds us that it is precisely at the moment in which we are the weakest that Christ comes to us. As we are powerless to make ourselves right with God, but rely on God's gracious love in Jesus Christ to restore the relationship that sin had broken ("But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us." – Romans 5:8), when we find that our voices cannot express what is in our hearts, God sends the Holy Spirit to help us in our weakness, interceding within the Christian at the point where he or she finds no words to express in God's presence. The Holy Spirit empowers us to bring all of our prayers to God in "sighs too deep for words" (Romans 8:26), so that we can truly exercise our privilege as God's people to carry "everything to God in prayer."

This month, we will once again gather for worship in Holy Week to survey "*the wondrous cross on which the prince of glory died.*" As we remember our Lord's suffering and death for the sake of all humanity, we may not find the voice or words to adequately express our emotions, our deepest feelings over what our Saviour has given us with his "*holy, precious blood and his innocent suffering and death.*" (*Small Catechism*). Perhaps all we can do when asked "*were you there when they crucified my Lord*" is to "*tremble, tremble, tremble.*" But it is at this moment of weakness, this hour of voicelessness that the Word of God speaks to us, boldly proclaiming that the death of Christ on the Cross is the moment of our liberation, because it is through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ that we have been given "*a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead*" (1 Peter 1:3), so that our tongues might be freed and our voices restored so that we might sing "*my great Redeemer's praise, the glories of my God and king, the triumphs of his grace!*" (ELW Hymn 886).

- "When everything is hopeless for us and all things begin to go against our prayers and desires, then those unutterable groans begin. Then 'the Spirit helps us in our weakness

(Romans 8:26). For unless the Spirit were helping, it would be impossible for us to bear this action of God by which he hears us and accomplishes what we pray for. Then the soul is told: 'Wait for the LORD; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the LORD!' (Psalm 27:14).” – Martin Luther.

My ordeal with voicelessness has taught me never to take this gift for granted, to be a good steward of the voice I use to speak, to sing, and to share God's love. But should another virus take it from me, I have that confidence of faith that all that is in my mind and heart will still be heard by our God who gives us the Holy Spirit so that we can give voice in all circumstances to give thanks and praise to God for the hope that is ours in the good news of this season: that **Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!**

### STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

It's tax time again!

To coincide with tax time, are you aware of what percentage of your gross income you are giving to charity?

Your tax return for 2016 tells you not only how much income God entrusted to you last year, but also what portion you gave away.

In order to calculate what percentage you gave away, simply take your total charitable contributions and divide by your total gross income. Take the answer and move the decimal point over two places. This is the percentage you gave away in 2016.



Example: Total gross income is \$42,653.00. Charitable contributions are \$1,250.00. \$1,250.00 divided by \$42,653.00 equals .0293. Move the decimal point over two places and the percent that this individual gave to charity was 2.9%

Once your percentage of what you gave away has been calculated, the question you need to ask yourself is, am I pleased with the number? If so, great! If not, maybe plans should be made now to improve your giving in 2017.

Something to prayerfully consider.
