(Psalm 46:10)

NATIONAL CHURCH CONVENTION

Lutherans from across the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada will meet in Saskatoon for the 13th Biennial National Convention taking place July 14-17. Steve Hoffard will be our lay delegate representing Zion Church. Pastor Doug will attend as a member of the National Church Council.

As delegates, visitors, staff and special guests come together for our National Convention we will be reminded that our call to be *In Mission for Others* articulates the mission and ministry of our church. This year we will come together for our convention

under the theme Covenant People: In Mission for Others.

Our theme is drawn from Isaiah 56:6-8 and focuses on our identity as God's servants, and on the responsibility we bear toward each other and collectively toward others by virtue of this covenant. We are joined together in the covenant of baptism and called to live our lives as disciples of Jesus. ELCIC National Bishop Susan C. Johnson has been encouraging the ELCIC community to engage in a call to spiritual renewal and to be a more visible witness to our neighbours. At National Convention, we will explore aspects of this call to read, pray, worship, study, serve, give and tell.

The word "covenant" is also a synonym for "treaty," so the theme Covenant People: *In Mission for Others* gives us the opportunity to explore how we as a church and as Canadians are treaty people, and challenge ourselves to renewed relationships between indigenous and non-indigenous people.

The 2011 National Convention logo is comprised of the visual elements of a pitcher and water, signs of the baptism that gathers and connects us. This life-giving water is ever weaving around and through God's covenant people.

LUTHERAN PLANNED GIVING

Jeff Pym, the Lutheran Planned Giving Director for our Eastern Synod of our Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada share the following with us:

THE BEQUEST

It's no wonder that 80% of all planned gifts to Canadian charities come in the form of bequests. A bequest can be one of the easiest, simplest and least expensive ways of making a planned gift to the church. In this article we'll take a look at the steps involved in making a charitable bequest.

A bequest is simply a gift specified in your last will and testament. Money, investments, real estate, collections and other personal property may be the subject of a bequest. Cash is often most useful to a church because it is needed to carry out the organizational mission. Other forms of property are frequently, although not always, converted to cash and then either invested or spent after they are received by the church.

The steps in establishing a bequest are fairly straightforward:

1. **Determine what will be given.** Cash is always appreciated, but gifts of appreciated property (investments, real estate, valuable collections of stamps, coins or art, etc.) can be beneficial to you from a tax point of view. It is particularly advantageous to

donate appreciated securities rather than to sell the investment and donate the proceeds.

- 2. Choose an amount. With gifts of money you can specify an amount, a percentage or a number of shares in the "residue" of your estate (what remains after debts and other gifts are discharged). Some people "adopt the church"; that is, they give a share to the church equal to what they give each of their children. Another choice is to make the church a contingent beneficiary. That gives to the church the bequest of any named heir who predeceases you. If you are bequeathing real or personal property, choosing an amount usually isn't an issue. By naming the item you are also determining the value of the gift.
- 3. Select the beneficiary(ies). There are different needs and opportunities within all expressions of the church congregational, synodical, national, institutional and Lutheran Planned Giving will help you make a gift to any of them. Whatever your choice, it is critically important to use the accurate corporate name of the beneficiary. Failure to get the name correct can result in long and expensive court proceedings to determine the rightful beneficiary. In cases where the will says one thing but you meant another, your real intentions may not be carried out.
- 4. **Decide on designations and restrictions.** You can choose to leave your gift for a specific purpose. Alternatively, by not designating a purpose you allow the governing body to use your gift where it's needed the most. Bequests can be left as endowments, where the money is invested and the principal is preserved in perpetuity, while only the income is spent. This ensures that there will always be income to support the designated purpose. If you don't restrict the gift in this way, both the principal and the income may be spent as they are needed.
- 5. **Take your list of decisions to your lawyer.** Your lawyer will convert your choices into the language of a will. Make sure you select a lawyer whose advice your trust, and then take that advice.
