

PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

"O Canada, our home and native land."

At the beginning of our weekly Rotary Club meetings, I am often called upon to lead the club in the singing of "O Canada" (and it is often noted that it is the one person in the club who isn't a Canadian citizen who's leading the singing of the Canadian national anthem!). "O Canada" has become such a beloved feature of our nation that it may be surprising to note that it wasn't officially proclaimed the national anthem of Canada until July 1, 1980 ("God Save the Queen" had been the more widely-sung anthem up until that time). The anthem was written by Robert Stanley Weir in 1908 to mark the 300th anniversary of the founding of Quebec City. It was published in November of that year with an arrangement of the music by Alfred Grant-Schafer. In *The Common School Book of Vocal Music* (1913), the original line "true patriot love thou dost in us command" was changed to "true patriot love in all thy sons command," the version that is sung to this day (even as some changes are being proposed). As Canada celebrates the 150th Anniversary of Confederation this year, people across the country will be joining their voices together in singing of how "with glowing hearts we see thee rise, the true north strong and free" and pledge ourselves to "stand on guard for thee."



While Canada may not be our "native land," it is the country that Susan and I call home, and so we will be joining with our friends and neighbours on July 1 in celebrating the birthday of Canada and offering prayers that "God keep our land glorious and free." Our prayers for this nation are in keeping with the original intent of the anthem's composer, who wrote additional verses that are not frequently sung but which call upon God to bless all the people who call

Canada home:

- "Ruler Supreme, who hearest humble prayer, hold our dominion within thy loving care. Help us to find, O God, in thee, a lasting rich reward, as waiting for the better day, we

ever stand on guard."

As we join with Canadians across the country in celebrating our nation's birth on this Canada Day, as Christians we are also taught by St. Paul to *"be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God."* (Romans 13:1). Martin Luther interpreted this to mean that *"Christians should be subject to the governing authorities and be ready to do every good work, not that they shall in this way be justified, since they already are righteous through faith, but that in the liberty of the Spirit they shall by so doing serve others and the authorities themselves and obey their will freely and out of love."* (*The Freedom of a Christian*, 1520). This does not mean that Christians should accept whatever decisions governments make without question, nor does it mean that governments have absolute authority in their decision-making processes; the proper function of secular government is to be God's servants in promoting the good and punishing the evil. When any government *"claims for itself the kind of devotion proper only to God and demands of its subjects that they perform evil rather than good ... that government no longer functions as a servant of God and is therefore no longer to be obeyed as such."* (Paul Achtemeier).

As we celebrate Canada's birthday on July 1, we join with people across the country in praying that God will bless this nation that is home to people from many lands who give thanks that we live in a land that is "the true north strong and free." We pray that God will guide those who lead our nation; that God will bless people throughout the land with the gifts of peace and freedom; and that God will use us as servants who seek to be faithful to fulfilling our call to be *"true to our God, true to our native land"* (ELW Hymn 841).

- "O Lord, we gather together in your presence this Canada Day ... Make us, who come from many different backgrounds and countries, a united people – one in purpose and vision. Give our government a spirit of wisdom and compassion that there may be justice and peace in our land. When times are prosperous, lead us to thanksgiving, and when times are troubled, lead us to a deepening trust in you. All this we ask in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen." – Trinity Anglican Church, Barrie, Ontario.

May *"God keep our land glorious and free"* on this Canada Day and for generations to come who will call this nation home!

VICAR’S DEVOTIONAL

Well, it’s been just over a month at Zion, and I’m already starting to feel at home. I usually find the most challenging part of joining a new community is the process of trying to learn people’s names; trying to figure out how each person fits into the community; and trying to remember who is connected with who. In addition to these challenges, there is always that looming question of how I myself, will fit into the group, and whether or not people will like me, or even accept me as I am. Oh, the joyful insecurities of wanting to belong!

Church communities however, are a bit different. Of course, there are still names to learn, and dynamics to understand, but the context is unique. The difference is that in Christ’s Church, I already know that every person I meet here, is a called and beloved disciple of Jesus. That tells me a lot already. I know that each person has been bestowed with gifts for their own calling and ministry within the Church. That tells me that my future is inseparably connected with yours. And I know that despite my own quirks and shortcomings, I am welcome, I am loved, and I have a home in the Body of Christ.

St. Paul teaches:

“Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, “Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body,” that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, “Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,” that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, “I have no need of you,” nor again the head to the feet, “I have no need of you.” On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it”. (1 Cor.12:14-27)

I give thanks, for all the people and parts of this congregation. Thank you for reminding me, that where ever I go, I have a home in the Body of Christ.

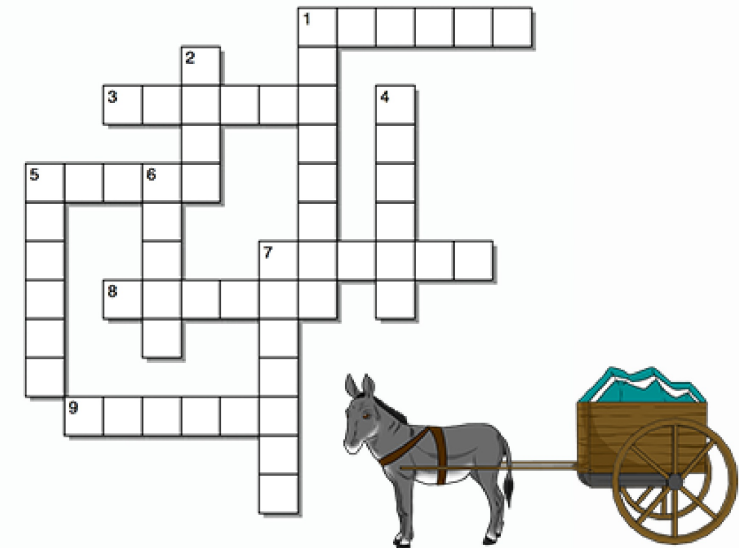

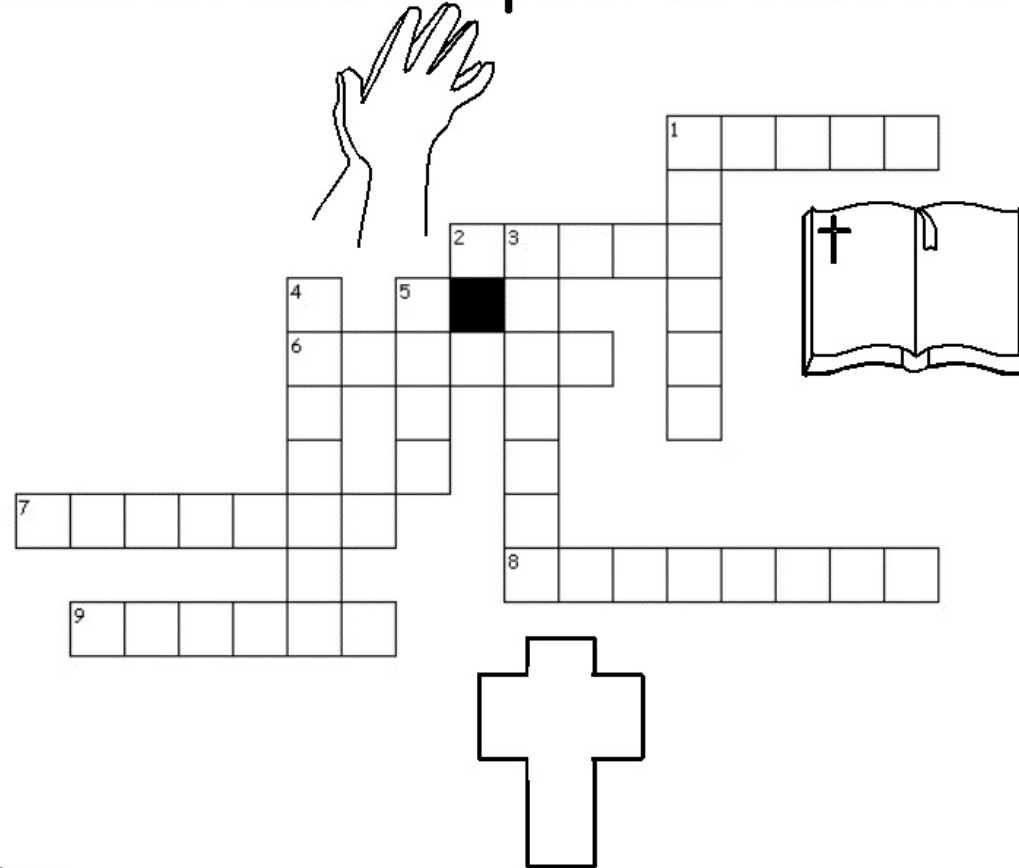
