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### FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN

**“Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.”** – Psalm 51:10

**Question:** How many Lutherans does it take to change a light bulb?

**Answer:** WHAT DO YOU MEAN “CHANGE”?!



In fairness to us change-adverse Lutherans, you could use this joke to refer to a wide variety of people and groups who are threatened by change. Change implies risk; it means letting go of what is safe and familiar in order to take hold of something which may be unknown and unproven. I have to confess that as a creature of habit, I often have a difficult time embracing change: I eat the exact same breakfast every morning, usually park in the same location at every store where I shop,

and have a desktop that borders on being obsessive-compulsive. As a pastor, who is often faced with unexpected changes of plans and circumstances, it is often comforting to have routines that are safe and familiar, and any changes in even the simplest of tasks can create tremendous stress and anxiety.

Yet there are some changes that are important, and even essential. If we are faced with a health crisis, we have to make lifestyle changes in the way we eat, the amount of sleep we get every night, and the manner in which we deal with stress. If we lose our job (as many people are presently facing), we have to make unexpected changes in our household budget as we face the uncertainty that unemployment foists upon us. If we are under the throws of addiction, we know that change is necessary if we are going to survive and live the abundant lives that God desires for each of us.

The season of Lent that we have entered into is a call to change, an invitation to *“return to the LORD your God, who is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love.”* (Joel 2:13). Lent calls us to look at the path our lives have taken, and to make the necessary changes in direction from those which have led us away from God’s loving presence in order that we might return to the source of blessing. As all of nature will soon experience the newness of life that comes with the season of spring, Lent is also a season of new life, a change from ways that lead to sickness unto death

to new directions and fresh perspectives on all that is possible for those who love and follow our Lord. Lent is a time for us to look to the Lord who will *“restore to me the joy of your salvation, and sustain in me a willing spirit.”* (Psalm 51:12); to return to the Lord so that we might receive God’s blessing of *“a new heart [that] I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you”* (Ezekiel 36:26); and to open our hearts and our lives to our Saviour who will make us *“a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!”* (2 Corinthians 5:17).

On Wednesdays in this holy season of Lent, we gather for worship around the theme of **Making Change**. The change that is offered to us is far more than what we eat or what we wear or even how well we care for ourselves; it is the change that only our Lord can provide, the change that can turn despair into hope, sorrow into joy, and even death into life. We will explore what it means when we are confronted with a **Change of Season, Change of Habit, Change of Circumstances, Change of Heart, and Change of Plans**. Although contemplating such profound changes may provoke anxiety, we come together knowing that the one constant in the midst of any change is God’s loving, steadfast presence which never fails, never fades, and never ends.

At the end of this Lenten season, I’ll probably continue to eat the same breakfast every morning and keep my desktop as fanatically organized as usual; but the kind of change that our Lord invites us to embrace is of far greater significance than our daily routines and habits. It is a change that can open new doors, invite us to consider new possibilities and directions, and create renewed hope and newness of life. It is the change that is ours as we journey in this Lenten season toward Christ’s death and resurrection, the ultimate change that is the hope that is ours in this and all seasons and children of our God of constant change and unchanging love.

Living & Learning kits project is still going on. Copies of what you need for a kit is on the table at the back of the church. The box to place them in is under the table.

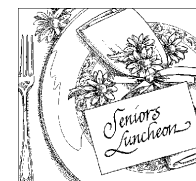
