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# PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL "GOD'S ANGRY PEOPLE"

Over these last few Sundays, the biblical hero Moses who led God's people out of Egypt in the Bible account of the Exodus, has been the focus of our Old Testament readings in the appointed Sunday lectionary. I've been reminded that Moses had a temper. He killed an Egyptian whom he saw mistreating a Hebrew slave. He smashed the tablets of the Law that God had given him, and in the wilderness he struck a rock because he was angry with the people. David, another Old Testament hero, was also an angry man – angry at the prophet Nathan, at his sons, at his enemies.



Just as anger was a part of these people's lives, it is part of ours. The emotions shown by God – delight in us, joy, sadness, grief, compassion, anger, and all the others – are designed into us as well, because we are made in God's image. To deny these emotions is unhealthy and limiting.

Yet many of us have difficulty with anger – in opposite ways. I know I do. Some of us express our anger too strongly and too readily. Others of us hide our anger, even denying that we feel it. These two opposite behaviours may arise from a common cause: experiencing destructive patterns of dealing with anger.

Let me illustrate with a story of a man I know. He describes himself as a recovering rage-aholic, by the work of God's grace in his life. Before he gave up his rages, his family's life revolved around trying to keep him happy and calm, much as the life of a family distorted by alcoholism revolves around the behaviour of the alcoholic. He tells about formerly screaming at and threatening his wife and children. They lived in fear of his outbursts and tried (always unsuccessfully) to avoid saying or doing anything that might set him off. This man grew up in a home where his father had controlled everyone by inducing fear, and he carried that destructive pattern into his family's life.

Those who witness angry outbursts may come to fear anger – other's anger and their own. Anger may seem like an uncontrollable monster that could overwhelm us if we allow it out – so we keep it under emotional lock and key. We may keep it so well contained, in fact, that we may be unaware it exists. Have you ever asked, "Are you angry?" and received a

response of, "No, I'm fine" from someone whose body language made it clear in some other way that they were angry? Many people bury their anger and deny it expression because they are trying to be "good Christians."

We seem to think that deeply spiritual people do not become angry. The Bible does not teach this. Moses is a great hero and David described as "a man after the Lord's own heart (1 Samuel 13:14). Their anger did not disqualify them from participating in God's work. Feeling anger is not wrong. In fact, the Bible directs us to admit and deal with our anger. When we are at odds with a brother or sister, we are to go and be reconciled (Matthew 5:21-24). But scripture also tell us to be slow to anger, as God is slow to anger, and always to be careful to show love.

The issue with anger and any other emotion is how we treat others as we express our feelings. Ephesians tells us to let go of our anger promptly, not letting the sun go down on it (4:26) – in other words to deal with today's hurts today and not to nurse grudges. But this does not mean that we are free to rage at one another or mistreat one another. Matthew 5 says that we are not to insult others or call them names. We can express our anger in ways that frighten others and limit their lives, or we can "speak the truth in love" (4:15), admitting truthfully what we feel but doing so with care not to belittle another. Ephesians tells us in another place that our words should always "minister grace" to our hearers (4:29). Harsh, demeaning words do not "minister grace" to our hearers.

Training ourselves to deal lovingly with others even when we are angry requires self-control. Self-control is one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit, who dwells in all believers. Of course, fruit takes time to grow. If we are addicted to rage or any other negative expression of emotion, we may not want to change. If that is the case, we begin where we are, asking God to help us become willing to be shaped by the Holy Spirit within us.

Our emotions are a part of who we are. To be fully human is to feel all of the emotions God has placed within us and to learn to express those emotions in ways that bring life and growth to us and to others.

Something to think about.

Thus says the Lord, the Holy One of Israel, and its Maker:

Will you question me about my children, or command me concerning the work of my hands? I made the earth, and created humankind upon it; it was my hands that stretched out the heavens, and I commanded all their host.

Isaiah 45:11-12



As I write this, my mind is on the adult education sessions I will be leading. The first session begins tonight. I have chosen to spend six weeks studying Islam, and more than one person has asked me, "Why Muslims?" What is a Christian church doing studying a different faith? This has caused me to reflect on the same question. Why Islam? I certainly could have picked an easier topic, after all I know very little about Muslims.



Yet I feel compelled to explore this topic further. I sense a call to uncover several of the misunderstandings surrounding Islam. Since the events of September 11. 2001, many live in fear of Muslims. It is easy to be afraid of the things that we do Grow not understand, to fear those who are different from us.

Cyrus, the founder of the Persian Empire is the only non-Israelite in the entire Old Testament to be recognized as one of God's anointed. In the verse above, Isaiah points out that, God created all humankind and works through Cyrus, and that Israel should not question God's way of working in the world.

Perhaps, we like Israel, are being called to recognize God at work in our Muslim sisters and brothers. Cyrus went on to release the nation of Israel from its exile. Proof that God works through all. This need not surprise us, after all didn't God create us all?

There are things we cannot imagine – but God already knows about them!

As you give, remember that you are not only preparing for the moment, but for all moments!

# **CALL TO SPIRITUAL RENEWAL**

Over the past couple of years, National Bishop has been encouraging a call for spiritual renewal and deeper discipleship within our church, which includes regular attendance at worship, daily prayer and scripture reading, involvement in a program of study, regular service in the community (not just the congregation), regular and proportional giving similar to the understanding of the tithe found in scripture, and commitment to sharing the good news with those around us, beginning with our family and friends. A simplified list of this call to deeper discipleship includes: Worship, Pray, Study, Serve, Give, Read, and Tell.

This month, we focus on the word "Worship!" Remember, don't overdo it! It's just like starting a physical exercise program. Start with one or two new practices and make them a habit before you take the next step.

#### **WORSHIP**

We are called to regular attendance at public and communal worship. Consider ways that you can increase your participation in regular worship. The following are a few ideas to get you started.

Commit to att	tending worship	at least once a	a month. More	often if possible!

#### MISSION IN THE WORLD UPDATE

#### Dear fiends In Mission for Others through Global Mission:

On behalf of all those who are involved in the ELCIC's Global Mission (GM) ministry, I would like to take this opportunity to extend our thanks and appreciation for your ongoing support. In 2010, designated giving to global mission exceeded over \$180,000 through the generous support of numerous congregations and individuals throughout the ELCIC.

In 2009, ELCIC GM entered into a formal partnership agreement with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Global Mission. Shared oversight of the companion synod programs, access for ELCIC members to the ElCA global service, including the Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM), and further recruitment and oversight for overseas staff are coordinated through this agreement.

Through ELCIC GM, we remained committed to the full administration, funding and supervision of the following three ELCIC mission areas.

- ★ El Salvador Rev. Brian Rude
- ★ Peru Rev. Fran Schmidt in Lima and Rev. Yoli Zavaleta in the Amazon Mission
- ★ Argentina, Patagonia Mission Rev. Gustavo Gomez and Rev. Sergio Utz

We would like to take this opportunity to give thanks to Long-Term Missionary Lori Endress for her many years of dedicated service. Lori served at Mahidol University in Bangkok, Thailand from 1991 to 2001 and as a teacher at the Payap University in Chang Mai,

Thailand from 2001 to 2010. In July 2011, Lori Endress returned to Canada and she is currently on medical leave. Thank you to those congregations and individuals who supported Lori in prayers, support and through your designated giving. If you have supported this area previously, we would like to ask that you please consider continuing your financial support to enable the ELCIC GM to be *In Mission for Others* in the world through ministry in the other existing program areas.

Your financial gifts to ELCIC GM make a difference in the world in the following ways:

In El Salvador, Rev. Brian Rude brings the hope of the gospel to those in prison. I visited Santa Anna Prison with Rev. Brian in May 2011 and was inspired by observing the groups Brian facilitated with gang members. These young men, many in prison for long terms, were hungry to hear the words of hope that Brian brought. Your financial support for the ministry in El Salvador is vital to continue the bringing of hope to those who are desperate to hear it.

The Peruvian Lutheran Church (ILEP) is a young church of only eighteen years. They have approximately four hundred and forty members in thirteen churches. ELCIC National Bishop Susan Johnson and I met with President Armando Capcha and the ILEP National Church Council in November of 2010. It was refreshing to hear them speak about the strong social justice initiatives in their strategic plan and their strong awareness that the relationship between the ELCIC GM and ILEP is not built on need but on discerning what God is up to and how we together can support God's work in Peru.

Under the supervision of ILEP, Rev. Fran serves as a part-time pastor at San Juan Camino de Esperanza, and she began serving as interim pastor to the congregation of Emmaus at the beginning of May 2011. Rev. Fran still fulfills some of the original requirements of her call with regards to teaching music and liturgy, but as ILEP continues to grow and change so have their needs.

Up in Iquitos, the Northern region of Peru, I visited with Rev. Yoli Zavaleta, Amazon Mission. In 2008, ELCIC GM agreed to a proposal from ILEP to continue the work of Rev. Katharine Bergbusch through the financial support of a local ILEP pastor in the ministry at the mission congregation of Fiel es Dios (God is Faithful). Iquitos is only accessible by boat or air and it is a delightful region to visit. The small congregation of Fiel es Dios celebrated a baptism and confirmation on the Sunday morning I attended. Their generosity, despite scarcity, was humbling. Your financial contribution goes a long way to support Rev. Yoli and the Fiel es Dios congregation.

In the Patagonia Mission in Argentina, Rev. Sergio Utz and Rev. Gustavo Gomez, faithfully serve local mission congregations. Since 2002, the ELCIC GM shares a joint mission with the United Evangelcial Lutheran Church (IELU) in Southern Argentina in supporting these two pastors. Your continued funds support Rev. Sergio in Esperanza del Sur (Hope of the South) congregation in Esquel and Cruz del Sur (Southern Cross) congregation in Bariloche and works with Mapuche aboriginals at Cushamen. Rev. Gustavo is Pastor at San Juan Bautista congregation in Comodoro Rivadavia and oversees the congregation's daycare.

Unfortunately, the reality is that over the past few years both general and designated support for ELCIC GM has declined (down 29% in the last 5 years), making it difficult to continue our commitments to these important ministries. Your financial gifts are vital if these ministry areas are to continue!

Thank you for your past support that has enabled this rich work to be undertaken, as well as for your continued support and future engagement *In Mission for Others* in the world through your financial support of ELCIC GM.
