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PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

"It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you, almighty and merciful God, through our Saviour Jesus Christ." – Evangelical Lutheran Worship.



There's an old adage that states that the difference between an optimist and a pessimist is whether they see a glass of water as "half-empty" or "half-full." It's the difference between looking at what the glass contains versus what it lacks, looking at the full half on the bottom or the empty half on the top. While it's somewhat simplistic, it does speak of the different viewpoint with which any people look upon their lives and the world around them: are we thankful for what we have or woeful for what we lack?

As we approach Thanksgiving Day this month, we are once again called to give thanks for all of the blessings we have received. We will gather in worship on Thanksgiving Sunday surrounded by signs of the abundant harvest that has been gathered from fields in our area. We will sing our thanks to God for "all good gifts around us [that] are sent from heaven above," joining our voices as one as we "thank you, Lord, for all your love." God's Word will call us to "enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him, bless his name" (Psalm 100:4), giving thanks to our Lord Jesus Christ who is "the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." (John 6:35). We give thanks on Thanksgiving Day for the same reasons we give thanks every day: for all that God bestows on us "out of pure, fatherly goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness of mine at all!" (Small Catechism).

Yet even in the midst of our Thanksgiving celebrations, it's easy for us to focus on the empty half of the glass, on that we lack or we have lost. It may be relationships that no longer exist or never materialized to meet our expectations. It may be possessions we have lost or were never

able to acquire. It may be dreams that were never realized or plans that only partially succeeded. Even as we give thanks for the blessings we have received, we may also feel loss or frustration over what we no longer have or never had in the first place.

Whether we gather on this Thanksgiving Day to celebrate our abundance or mourn our scarcity, the Word of God calls us to look upon the "glass" – the blessings that God has poured out upon us – not as "half-empty" or "half-full" but ALWAYS FULL, because there is nothing halfway about what God has given to us. All that we have – our lives, our homes, our community, all of the good things we need – are bestowed upon us freely and without reservation by our God who never holds back on blessing us at all times and in all places. Not only does God provide us with all we need for daily living (the "daily bread" of the Lord's Prayer that includes all of the necessities and nourishment for our bodies, including food, drink, shelter, good weather, good government, health, and peace); God proved his love for us by giving his only Son "so that I may belong to him, live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in eternal righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he is risen from the dead and lives and rules in eternity. This is most certainly true." (Small Catechism). For God's people, our glass is never "half-empty" or "halffull"; it us "from his fullness [that] we have all received, grace upon grace." (John 1:16). In his article "The Liturgy of Abundance, the Myth of Scarcity," Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggemann identifies abundance, the "full glass" of God's grace, as the message that is at the heart of the gospel upon which the church's faith is built:

"The conflict between the narratives of abundance and of scarcity is the defining problem confronting us ... The gospel story of abundance asserts that we originated in the magnificent, inexplicable love of a God who loved the world into generous being. The baptismal service declares that each of us has been miraculously loved into existence by God. And the story of abundance says that our lives will end in God, and that this well-being cannot be taken from us. In the words of St. Paul, neither life nor death nor angels nor principalities nor things – nothing can separate us from God." (The Christian Century, March 1999).

Thanksgiving Day calls all of us to offer thanks for the abundance that God bestows upon us at all times and in all seasons, an abundance that keeps our glass full no matter how often we draw upon it. As God's love knows no scarcity, our response is to be as generous, as giving, as beneficent as is the one who gives freely and fully to us. We love because God first loved us; we give thanks because God has given and continues to give us all good gifts; and we in turn give of ourselves, our time, and our possessions so that all may experience the abundance that knows no limits. As our glasses are always full, we in turn seek to make certain that everyone's

glass around us is full as well, so that all may give thanks and praise to "God, whose giving knows no end." (ELW Hymn 678).

WE FACE EACH OTHER

On September 13, I completed my final meeting with the *Candidacy Committee* of the Synod. This is a committee of three whom I have been meeting with since I began my work at the seminary in preparation for my vocation in pastoral ministry.



The meeting went well. We spoke about my call to ministry, my years at seminary, and now my year here at Zion. I must say that I had nothing to say but gushing gratitude for my time at Zion. The way I was welcomed into your church, into your homes and into your community. Yes, so much

gratitude.

After the meeting I was endorsed to receive what is called the *Bishop's Exam*. The first portion of this is a *written examination* which I received on September 13 and will have until October 21 to complete; and the second part of the exam is an *oral examination* which will occur on October 27 in front of an examining committee. After this I will find out within 48 hours whether I have been endorsed for ordination. Assuming all goes well, the *call* process may begin after this.

It all seems to have gone by so quickly.

The other day I was in the Inuit Gallery in Stratford, a place I visit often. I found a card there that I bought for Anne. It was a card of a painting by the artist Michael Robinson that depicted a canoe with two occupants facing each other while traveling down a river – the one was paddling while the other was collecting fish. The card struck me as a metaphor of our lives together, and the unknown that is tomorrow. It is a real journey we are on, with ups and owns - we support each other as we are able, but we also have disagreements, and sometimes we need to forgive each other. In other words, it is community. All the while though, we continue to move forward, down the river together, facing each other. Our journeys are connected to the end.

I wrote the following poem to go with the card.

There is a future we are moving toward

We wonder about it
We even fear it
Hoping to understand it before it arrives

Tomorrow is hidden
But there is nothing to fear
Tomorrow is also a gift
