PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL "WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?"

"As Paul and Barnabus were going out, the people urged them to speak about these things again the next Sabbath." (Acts 13:42)



Imagine that. When Paul finished preaching in Antioch, the worshipers who shook his hand at the conclusion of the service said, "Please preach that sermon again next week." What a startling request. To be sure, no one has ever said that to me in 29 years of preaching. After all, we want to be up on the latest. I suspect the people of Paul's day were no different. It was a new day and ordinarily they would want to hear a new

message.

So what could Paul have said in that sermon to elicit such an unlikely response? Quite simply, he told the story of God's fierce love affair with the world, first through the people of Israel and then through Jesus of Nazareth. Paul spoke of God's faithfulness throughout history, about the covenant God established with Israel, and about how God rescued the people from slavery in Egypt and led them into the Promised Land. He told them that all of history had been preparation for Jesus' birth and that when the right time came, God sent Jesus out of God's own being. Paul told the people that, though Jesus was blameless, he was crucified, but the promise of his coming was fulfilled when he was raised from the dead. And in his life is the source and meaning of our own lives. To that sermon, the people said, as they were shaking hands with Paul, "Please preach that sermon again next week."

A number of years ago, indeed I had only been five or so years into ordained ministry, I attended a conference on evangelism. The speaker sparked lively debate by defining evangelism as "chatting about Jesus" and by asking us, "When was the last time you told your congregation what Jesus means to you?" At the hotel bar afterwards those remarks sparked a lively exchange. Many felt the speaker's question was dangerously simplistic, that it smacked of fundamentalism, and represented the kind of piety they had hoped to

escape by being part of a liberal denomination like the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada.

As I reflected on the speaker's question, I came to realize it was both appropriate and challenging. As a Christian preacher I talk about Jesus a good deal, but talk about is quite different from expressing devotion. It is the difference between talking about a loved one and sending a love letter.

That speaker's question was still on my mind when I preached for the last time to my first parish of Mannheim/New Dundee where I had served for eight years. I spent almost the entire sermon speaking devotionally about Jesus, which would be about as unremarkable in some traditions as it is startling in our own. Here is how I concluded that sermon, which I titled, "What's It All About?":

"As I am about to leave, there is something I want to tell you. I want to tell you what Jesus means to me. I want to share my belief that everything depends on him. I want to urge you to lean on Jesus in times of trouble. I want to ask you to listen to his words of challenge. I want to tell you that I believe you can entrust your life to him. I want to affirm that he is Lord of this church, and that in his name you are freed to love one another and empowered to share that love with a hurting world. I want to profess that, though once people could not look at the face of God and live, now we are invited to look at the face of God in him, in Jesus, and live as we have never lived before. Jesus is Emmanuel, God with us, God with us all, whether we are together or apart. That's what it's all about. That's all I know. Amen."

My brothers and sisters. In the name of Jesus, I bid you farewell.

Goodbye. God be with you.

Pastor Dale Finch, your interim pastor, will serve you well, as will your new pastor whenever he or she is called. Thank you for your understanding.
