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PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

"GRATITUDE"

"But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." (1 Corinthians 15:57)

It was a stormy autumn night in 1860 with the waters of Lake Michigan churning up rough waves. Edward Spencer was walking along the shoreline and saw the tragedy happen.

A crowded steamboat, the Lady Elgin, was rammed by a freighter loaded with lumber. Within minutes 393 passengers were thrashing in the water as the steamboat broke up and sank a mile offshore.

Very few boats were available, so Spencer plunged in and swam toward the survivors. In seventeen desperate trips he managed to save seventeen persons. Even then 279 others died.

The young man was acclaimed as a national hero, but he never recovered from the emotional shock of seeing so many die. Unable to resume his university studies, he was admitted to an institution. He kept asking, "Did I do my best?"

A few years later Spencer, who never fully recovered emotionally and psychologically was contacted by the editor of a Chicago newspaper. The alert journalist had uncovered some old files of the original story and wondered about a follow-up on the now forgotten hero.

A reporter was sent to interview Spencer on his birthday. What was the most vivid memory of that fateful night?

Spencer sadly replied that not one of the seventeen persons he had saved ever returned to thank him.

Gratitude. Sometimes it is so neglected.

Ten lepers approached Jesus with their tales of woe and pleas for healing. They were tired



of being outcasts and separated from society. Their hopes were high when Jesus sent them to be examined by the priests who had medical authority to pronounce them clean if they were indeed healed. But the trip would have to be an exercise of faith in trusting Jesus to work a miracle after they left him. While they stood yet in his presence, no change was evident in their bodies. Nevertheless, in faith they left on a momentous mission and discovered happily their miracle of healing along the way.

Nine lepers rejoiced and proceeded on their journey. Only one "turned back, praising God with a loud voice." Only one thanked Jesus, and he was a Samaritan. The foreigner whose religious training was considered second-class to that of God's chosen people gave a first-class demonstration of gratitude.

The fact that he returned alone without the other nine was not lost on Jesus. More in sadness than in anger our Lord asked, "Were not ten cleansed? Where are the other nine?"

One out of ten is not a good response rate. Neither is zero out of seventeen, as in Spencer's tragic case. Where are the others? Where are we?

As a national holiday Thanksgiving rolls around with precise annual regularity. It's time to stop complaining, to praise, and to count our blessings. For one day a year we practice the grace of gratitude.

Perhaps here is a better idea. We could designate one annual event on our national and personal agenda to complain, grumble, and close our eyes on all our blessings from God and people. Then the other 364 days we could live as a thankful people of God "always and for everything, giving thanks to God in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." (Ephesians 5:20).

Possible. Probably not. But something to think about.

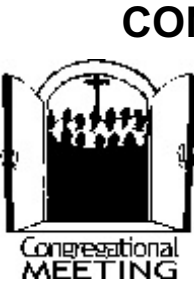
THANKSGIVING AT ZION

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING: OCTOBER 21

As many of you are aware, for the last two years the Church Painting Task Force has been meeting and discerning how to deal with the restorations, both plastering and painting, that are needed in the church sanctuary at Zion. At the September meeting of Zion's Church Council, their recommendation was received and after much discussion, Church Council is now presenting their recommendation to the congregation for your approval. To this end, please note:

Zion Lutheran Church will hold a special congregational meeting to be held immediately following the 10 AM worship service on Sunday, October 21. All confirmed members of Zion Church have voice and vote and are requested to attend. The purpose of the meeting is to approve the recommendations that will be coming to you, and to approve the financing of the project. For this project to proceed a 2/3 majority will be required with voting by secret ballot.

To help you in your own discernment and prayerful reflection, we share the following with you:

1. The proposal involves change to the current sanctuary. Though most of the beautiful symbols and artwork will remain, some features will be eliminated and

some enhanced. The enhancements will lift up two of the beautiful qualities of our sanctuary which is the wood and stained glass.

2. The sanctuary's current design has been in existence for 60 years. Though it was touched up and repainted in the 1980's, the design was done in the 1950's. Before that, the walls and ceilings were plain.
3. It is an expensive project thus we need the support of the congregation for it to proceed. The cost is \$140,000.
4. A major project of this undertaking means the church sanctuary will not be in use in the summer of 2013 should the congregation approve the recommendations. It is our hope to conduct Sunday worship services in our Fellowship Hall. Weddings and funerals will have to be held off site.
5. To help you in your decision making, the Church Painting Task Force and Church Council will hold an open house on Sunday, October 14 after church, Monday October 15 from 7-9 PM and Tuesday, October 16 from 2-4 PM in our Church Parlour. The purpose of the open house is to allow members of the congregation to see the changes up close and to ask any and all questions that they might have. Members of the Task Force and Church Council will be present.

May God bless our congregation with wisdom as we decide how best to proceed. Change is never easy. But neither should it be avoided. We love the church God has blessed us with at Zion. We also need to take care of it.

At the request of our church insurance provider, the first pews in our balcony in our sanctuary cannot be used until our guardrails are in accordance with the Ontario Building Code. For purposes of liability, we have no choice but to comply with the regulations which now require a minimum height of 42 inches. Currently they are 38 inches high. Our Property Committee and Church Council are arranging for the necessary work to be done, work which will require the approval of the city Building Department and may need the services of an engineer. A STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

For some of us the movie version of The Wizard of Oz is so familiar we can quote it as easily as the Bible – or should we shamefacedly say, more easily! Anyway, there’s a scene towards the end when the cowardly lion announces he’s going to do something brave – he will enter the witch’s castle to save Dorothy. Nothing will stop him, neither the witch nor the guards. He does have one final request for his friends, “Talk me out of it!”



Jesus is pretty clear in this week’s Gospel passage from Mark, where he speaks with a rich young man and then with his disciples. The rich young man wants to know what he should do to inherit eternal life. When Jesus answers by quoting from the Ten Commandments, the young man replies that he does all that. Jesus then tells him to sell all he has, give it to the poor, and follow. The rich young man walks sadly away. Jesus goes on to tell his disciples that it is easier for a camel to get through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of God.

This is a challenging passage, and our response tends to be, “Talk me out of it!” Some say the command to sell all we have was just for that rich young man. Some say there was a gate into Jerusalem so narrow that traders had to take some of the bags off their donkeys so they could enter the city, and so Jesus meant the rich should give some, but not all, of

their wealth to the church (not to the poor, mind you!).

Now the fact is that Jesus is often very funny (though we who are so solemn don’t always get the joke), and the image of a camel squeezing through the eye of a needle probably got a laugh – and heads nodding in response. But the challenge is real. Instead of saying, “Talk me out of it!” why not imagine what it would be like, since nothing is impossible with God, to do this. Imagine what it would mean if all our resources were dedicated to the work of God. Imagine what it would mean for our spiritual, emotional, and physical well-being if we truly lived in the Kingdom of God.

Something to think about!
