

## PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

***“Now after [the wise men] had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, ‘Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him.’” – Matthew 2:13.***

In the midst of the joyous story of Christmas lies this ominous reminder that the birth of our Saviour was not good news to everyone, especially to Herod the Great, who received the news of *“the child who has been born king of the Jews”* (Matthew 2:2) as a threat to his own illegitimate claim to the throne. His maniacal thirst for power leads Herod to order the slaughter of the Holy Innocents, *“all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old and under”* (2:16) to ensure that this child would not usurp his authority. But through the intercession of the angel of the Lord, Joseph takes Mary and the baby Jesus and flees to Egypt, *“and remained there until the death of Herod.”* (2:14). On that day, Jesus and his parents became refugees, escaping the violence of their homeland to find a place where they found a welcome refuge until it was safe for them to return.



Today, millions of people are following in the footsteps of our refugee Lord and Saviour, fleeing the violence of their homelands to find a place of safety for themselves and their children. They are risking everything because it is impossible for them to remain in their homes, where like Jesus they would meet with certain death at the hands of ruthless despots. They are seeking what God desires for all of his children to enjoy: the goodness of God’s creation in which *“God daily and abundantly provides shoes and clothing, food and drink, house and farm, spouse and children, fields, livestock, and all property – along with all the necessities and nourishment for this body and life.”* (Small Catechism). As we watch the events unfolding in the Middle East and Europe, where millions of people are fleeing from the violence in their homelands – especially Syria – we are called to remember that as Christ found refuge among the people of Egypt, our call as followers of our refugee Lord is to seek ways in which we

can serve our Saviour by working so that those who seek what God desires for them might find a place of safety where they will know that *“God protects me against all danger and shields and preserves me from all evil.”*

The sheer magnitude of the refugee crisis (in addition to the hundreds of thousands of refugees in Europe, some 4 million people are living in refugee camps in Jordan, Lebanon, and Turkey) may overwhelm us and cause us to question how we can make a difference. But because we are members of the Body of Christ that is serving both here at home and around the world, there are many ways in which we can reach out to those in need in the name of Christ the true King:

- Our Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and Canadian Lutheran World Relief have issued an appeal to support Syrian refugees suffering and displaced by brutal violence in their country. Through the support of on the ground partners such as the Lutheran World Federation, CLWR is working with Syrian refugees who have settled in communities in Jordan and Iraq. Funds received will go to provide basic needs such as clothing, personal hygiene supplies, and food; assistance is also being provided to help refugee children returning to school as well as support programs for young adults affected by trauma. Donations made through the end of the year will be matched dollar-for-dollar by the Canadian government through the Syria Emergency Relief Fund. - Members of our congregation are in contact with relatives in Germany whose congregations are working to resettle Syrian refugee families in their communities. We will be working to coordinate direct assistance to these congregations and will share additional information when it becomes available.
- At a recent meeting at the Kiwanis Centre chaired by Mayor Dan Mathieson, the Stratford community committed itself to resettling five refugee families in our city with the assistance of the Mennonite Central Committee. Fundraising efforts include a benefit performance of *The Last Wife* at the Stratford Festival on Friday, October 9. Additional fundraising efforts and volunteer opportunities will be announced in the coming weeks.

Toward the end of Matthew’s Gospel, Jesus reminds his followers that *“truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.”* (25:40). Among the signs that Jesus’ disciples are serving him are situations when *“I was a stranger and you welcomed me”* (25:38). When we reach out to those who are seeking a safe refuge as our

Lord and his parents found one when they were refugees from Herod’s violence, we are being faithful in *“serving all people, following the example of our Lord Jesus” (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, Affirmation of Baptism)*. As the people of Egypt sheltered the infant Jesus so that he might live to become our Redeemer, may we work to provide shelter to those who follow in Christ’s refugee footsteps so that all might be blessed by the fullness of God’s blessings that include a safe place to call home.

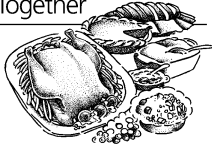
ZION CHOIR ANNUAL FALL FUNDRAISER

**15th Biennial  
ELCIC National Convention**  
**July 9-12, 2015**  
**Edmonton, Alberta**  
*Shaw Conference Centre*

To my surprise, the London Conference elected me as a rostered delegate to the most recent national convention of the ELCIC. Zion supported the election financially.

As a Church we are moving forward with substantial activities and interests. It was a full schedule, and the motions and discussions were serious ones. The atmosphere was one of "let's get down to the real business of being Church." While there were the regular and important items of worship, financial reports, budgets, constitutional changes and elections, of most important were the new decisions that we made.

The National Church Council prepared the way and provided strong leadership. Six motions were made and passed, proposed by the NCC. Five of them require that each congregation take them seriously, and both study and act on them. Zion, as other congregations, has work to do! These five commitments are briefly described below, with more information on the ELCIC website.

As a church we have agreed to:

**Commemorate** (not celebrate) **the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Reformation** in 2017 by providing 500 new refugee sponsorships, planting 500,000 trees, providing 500 new scholarships for students in schools of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, and raising \$500,000 for the LWF endowment fund. A large commitment. We need to do our part.

**Advocate restorative justice approaches to the Criminal Justice and Corrections System** in Canada. We are invited to seek a deeper understanding of Canada's criminal justice system, make our evaluations known, and participate fully in the 3<sup>rd</sup> week of November "Restorative Justice Week." It is our job to advocate for the victim and the prisoner.

As a congregation, **study and then sign on to the "Welcoming The Stranger Affirmations For**

**Faith Leaders”** document. The call to “welcome the stranger,” through protection and hospitality, and to honour the stranger or those of other faiths with respect and equality, is deeply rooted in all major religions. Sufficient material is provided to study and find ways to enable each member of this congregation to sign on.

**“The Doctrine Of Discovery”:** We are repudiating and renouncing this doctrine as fundamentally opposed to the gospel of Jesus Christ and our understanding of the inherent rights that individuals and peoples have received from God. For those of us who are unaware, this “Doctrine Of Discovery” is deeply embedded in our nation and its history. In brief, it means that white people from Europe “discovered” this country – that no one of value was living here before they came – that thus the white people from Europe “own” this land and have a right to enforce First Nations people to live on reserves. As a congregation, Zion is now committed to learn more, to find ways of being companions, not overlords, and to work toward reconciliation with our First Nations peoples. There is much more. Visit the Truth and Reconciliation website.

**Climate Justice:** As members of Lutheran World Federation, a Communion of Churches, we are committed to joining the global Christian community and people of all faiths and persuasions, on the journey for climate justice. As a congregation, we are called to take specific actions, such as register as an Accredited Greening Congregation. This task is one that we can only achieve when we unite in a common cause.

Of course, one of the highlights, was the re-election of Bishop Susan Johnson as national bishop for a third four year term. We are also entering into a period of change as we downsize the scale of our conventions. In 2018 Synod conventions will elect delegates for the 2019 National Convention, and bishops will have a 6 year term of office. 2019 may be a Joint Assembly with the Anglican Church.

Thank you, Zion, for supporting my election and participation in our National Convention. I am truly grateful to witness our Church taking risky action and providing the leadership we need as we struggle together to understand God’s call to us in this day.
