PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

"While [Jesus] was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven." – Luke 24:51.

During my years as a student at Stony Brook School, our teachers would host a monthly party for everyone who had a birthday during that month. While I always enjoyed being honoured at the March party, I always felt sorry for my classmates who had birthdays during July and August. Our teachers tried to make up for it by including them in the June or September parties, but you could tell that these students were disappointed that their birthdays were overlooked simply because they fell during a time when school was in recess for the summer.



In many ways, the Day of Ascension feels like those summer birthdays; it's a day in Scension the church year that's often overlooked because of where it falls during the Easter season. According to Luke (in both his Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles), Jesus ascended to heaven forty days after his resurrection, which means that Ascension

Day always occurs on a Thursday, when most churches do not have worship services. Some churches attempt to make up for this by observing "Ascension Sunday" on the following Lord's Day, but this major festival day is still the most overlooked occasion in our remembrance of Jesus' life and ministry.

In both of Luke's accounts of the Ascension of our Lord, Jesus' ascension follows his commissioning his disciples to be "witnesses" (martyria), becoming the "apostles," those who will be "sent out" to proclaim the good news of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ:

- "... repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things." – Luke 24:47-48.
- "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." – Acts 1:8.

The Ascension of our Lord is a necessary part of Jesus' ministry as our Saviour and Lord. Martin Luther describes it as our Lord's "proper work":

"Christ is seated in the heavenly places waiting for the time when his enemies will be made his footstool [Psalm 110:1]. That is his proper work. He does not sleep, but he watches us. He does not ask anyone to substitute for him; he does it himself... What now is our comfort? It is Christ, our priest, who has atoned for us and looks on us and sees our enemies and reminds the Father that he is our portion ... [assuring us] that Christ is our advocate."

This year, the Ascension of our Lord will be celebrated by Lutherans in our area. Our Nith Valley Ministry Area will be gathering for worship on Ascension Day, Thursday, May 10 at 7:00 p.m. at Trinity Lutheran Church in New Hamburg. In addition to celebrating our Lord's Ascension, we will be honouring the ministry of our first Dean, Pastor Bonnie Schelter Brown, as well as installing me officially as the Dean of the ministry area. Pastor Christie Morrow Wolfe, the synod Ministry Director for Youth and Young Adult Ministries (and a Stratford resident) will be the preacher. It will be an occasion to gather in worship and celebration of the one who is Lord of all as well as a celebration of our shared ministry here in Nith Valley. I look forward to worshiping with you on a day that will not be overlooked this year, a day when we give thanks for "our Lord, enthroned in heavenly splendor ... heaven and earth with loud hosanna worship you, the Lamb who died." (ELW Hvmn 475).

I leave you knowing that God is with you, and Pastor Jeff will guide you in wisdom and love. As for me, I ask that you remember the words of our Apostle Paul:

"Devote yourselves to prayer, keeping alert in it with thanksgiving. At the same time pray for us as well that God will open to us a door for the Word, that we may declare the mystery of Christ, for which I am a prisoner, so that I may reveal it clearly as I should" (Colossians 4:2-4).

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS



Bridgebuilder Program action items were discussed at the March Congregational Council Meeting and a Special Congregational Council Meeting was scheduled for Wednesday, April 4, 2018 to specifically review the action items and to plan future Church steps. The plan is that we will be moving forward with Town Hall Meetings to have Council News more conversations with our members as to topics within the Bridgebuilder Action Plan Report. The first Town Hall Meeting is scheduled for Sunday, April 22, 2018

after the morning worship service.

The Property Committee is presently in conversations with the City of Stratford as to their eventual sign-off on the fire suppression system. We were informed of three items that still need to be addressed, namely, a letter from the company that oversees our fire panel as to confirming that the fire suppression system is properly set up within the fire panel, secondly, a final engineers

report, that thirdly the light closest to the fan above the stoves needs to be moved further away from the fan. A final site visit is being planned after these two items are addressed.

The recommended Guidelines for Capital Project Approval were approved by the Congregational Council. The Guidelines will be posted on Zion's website as well as on the Bulletin Boards.

Judy Stanley has set up a team for Zion for this year's Relay for Life on June 1st. More information will follow.

The installation service for Pastor Jeff as Dean of the Nith Valley Ministry Area will take place on Thursday, May 10, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. at Trinity Lutheran Church, New Hamburg.

A new job description has been completed and approved by the Congregational Council for the position of Minister of Music at Zion.
