#### **PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL**

"Like obedient children, do not be conformed to the desires that you formerly held in ignorance. Instead, as he who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct; for it is written, 'You shall be holy, for I am holy.'" - 1 Peter 1:14-16.



Every Sunday throughout the years of my childhood, I would join my falled to parents in our family pew (fifth row from the front on the pulpit side) at our family church in North Plainfield. It was a charming sanctuary that still evokes fond memories; but those memories also include the

fear that some of the stained-glass windows in that worship space induced in me. They were depictions of some of the great saints of the church: St. Peter (the congregation's namesake), St. Matthew, St. Luke, St. John, and many of the other apostles of our Lord Jesus Christ. They were presented in a very traditional manner, with stern faces and eyes that seemed to stare at me as I sat (and often squirmed) between my parents on those hard wooden pews. Those saints seemed to be somehow different and superior to us mere mortals in the congregation; being a saint seemed to be out of reach to someone who was still learning what it means to be a Christian and how to live according to God's Will at a time when even keeping my room clean and doing my household chores was a challenging task.

That image of saints that I took from the stained-glass windows of my childhood church stayed with me when I went away to university and was discerning the call to ordained ministry that I first experienced at St. Peter's. This discernment process was very difficult for me; how could God possibly want me to be a pastor, to follow in the footsteps of those saints and apostles who were far holier than me? How could I fulfill the expectations of being a preacher of the Word of God when there was no way I could live up to the example those saints had set? I did not see any way that I could adequately fulfill such a calling; there was no way I could be a saint.

I was about to give up and switch majors when I ran into Dr. Max Nuscher, the university chaplain, as I was walking across campus. Max was very different from the pastors of my home congregation; he was a bright, funny, down-to-earth individual who seemed to be very human, not like the saints of my imagination. I attended worship services and Bible Studies with Max and other Ursinus students and was always inspired by his sermons and witness. Max saw that something was troubling me and invited me to join him at the Student Union for coffee. When I told Max that I was considering switching to another course of study and abandoning my preparations for seminary, he answered with words that I remember to this day: "Jeff, God created you; God knows you better than you know yourself; and if God is calling you to be a pastor God is calling you, with all your faults and imperfections. God wants the real Jeff to be God's servant in the world."

Max's words changed the course of my life and made me realize that saints are not larger-than-life figures who are somehow above human experience. Saints are everyday people, with the same faults and imperfections as all of us. The saints of the Bible are vastly different from how they are depicted in works of art or in stained-glass windows; Jesus' disciples were often vain, argumentative, selfish, arrogant, and clueless as to what it meant to be a follower of Christ; we may often wonder why Jesus did not replace them with a better group of adherents. But Jesus saw past their imperfections and shortcomings to persons who, with all of their faults, would still be the ones who would bring his Gospel to the ends of the earth. The call to be "holy" is not something we can achieve on our own; we are made holy in baptism, when we are "reborn children of God and made members of the church which is the body of Christ" (ELW Holy Baptism). We are called "just as I am" and made holy through the empowerment of the Holy Spirit "in order that you may proclaim the mighty deeds of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light." (1 Peter 2:9).

1. "To be a saint is to be human because we were created to be human. To be a saint is to live with courage and self-restraint ... to live with the hands stretched out both to give and to receive with gladness. To be a saint is to work and weep for the broken and suffering of the world, but it is also to be strangely light of heart in the knowledge that there is something greater than the world that mends and renews ... It is to live a life that is always giving itself away and yet is always full." – Frederick Buechner.

The saints that we will remember on All Saints Sunday – both the saints of Scripture and the saints we have known – were not perfect people; they were called by God in Holy Baptism and made holy through water and the Word so that they could share God's love with others and give us an example of how we as flawed, imperfect people can be saints to one another in our everyday lives. God does not call us to be "stained-glass saints"; God calls us to be "a people of his own who are zealous for good deeds" (Titus 2:14), a people "who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:20). On All Saints Sunday, we give thanks "for all the saints who from their labours rest" – the ordinary saints who are called and empowered to do extraordinary things as God's holy people, our Lord's everyday saints.

### HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE OCTOBER 2021 CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL MEETING



The October 20, 2021 Congregational Council Meeting was held in-person in the Fellowship Hall and via Zoom conference.

Investigations are continuing regarding the possibility of providing livestreaming for the Sunday worship services.

The Redevelopment Committee has been renamed the "Envisioning Committee" to better reflect our goals. Kevin Tuer, Franklin Famme and Tom Cosstick have volunteered to be the members of this Committee. A Virtual Roundtable is being planned for December 1st to bring together 10 community members, Dr. Mark Harris from Synod, Kevin, Franklin, Tom and possibly other members of Congregational Council.

It was decided that the annual deficit letter will be included with the November Newsletter which will be mailed to each member (no emails.) Therefore, the Newsletter will also include the deficit letter, contribution statement as of October 31st and a deficit envelope.

A Bequest in the amount of \$250,000.00 has been received from the Ken Rohfritsch Estate. Based on our current policy, 10% of the Bequest will be forwarded to the Synod Office. In addition, it was approved that \$25,000.00 be disbursed to the Building Fund immediately to increase the depleted balance in this fund. After discussion, it was approved to invest the balance, namely \$200,000.00 with the Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada (ELFEC) under a separate account designated Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church Special Reserve Fund. This Bequest is administered under a separate agreement with ELFEC and is not part of the Endowment Fund assets. It was also approved that the annual income from this Bequest be disbursed 75% to Zion and 25% retained in the Fund for growth. In addition, it was approved that the 75% of income from this Special Reserve Fund which is paid to Zion annually will be allocated 60% to the Current Fund, 15% to the Benevolence Fund and 25% to the Building Fund.

Donations/offerings, including donations to the Deficit Fund can continue to be completed via our Church website, including an option for E-Transfer, in addition to the

PAR program, mailing cheques or dropping off donations either at the Church office weekday mornings or in the locked mailbox at your convenience.

#### **ALL SAINTS' SUNDAY**



# 2021 MARKS THE 100<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF THE REMEMBRANCE POPPY



From the last Friday of October until Nov. 11, the Royal Canadian Legion is encouraging Canadians to remember by sporting the Flanders Fields flower.

The annual poppy drive is a chance for Canadians to honour veterans and remember the sacrifices they made for the freedoms we enjoy today.

In 1921, the poppy was adopted as the flower of remembrance, meaning this year marks the 100th anniversary of the remembrance poppy in Canada.

The Royal Canadian Legion estimates 20 million poppies will be distributed by its branches throughout Canada for 2021.

"I think it's important for every Canadian to remember why we're here, why we have such a wonderful place to live," says Allan Jones, president of Royal Canadian Legion Branch 560.

"Over 170,000 Canadians have died in wars since 1812, fighting for our freedom," Jones says. "So we cannot forget that, we cannot forget them."

All the money donated will stay within the community and be used directly to support veterans, their families and events.

The annual Remembrance Day campaign is the single largest fundraising effort by the legion.

This year, legion members are hoping their campaign receives more support than last year, with donations down significantly in 2020 due to the pandemic.

#### Dear Fellow Members of Zion:

As I write this letter, some of the COVID-19 restrictions are starting to be lifted. Of course, it is everyone's hope that the lifting of some of these restrictions will not hinder our progress as far as the virus as we move forward with these changes. More information regarding the lifting of the restrictions will be announced to our members during the month of November. As we all know, the journey these past nineteen months has greatly impacted all our lives in many ways and the hope is that as we move forward at this time, the changes that we are forced to endure will have positive effects on our lives. At least this needs to be our prayer. Enduring difficult times is a time that hopefully forces us to relook at our lives and make changes for the better along with gaining a keener insight to what is really important as well as focusing our thoughts on the things for which we need to be most thankful. As your Treasurer, I will be one of the first that needs to follow my own advice as I oversee my role along with walking alongside each one of you. For me, I must admit that the past nineteen months have been very stressful. This time has created financial challenges for our Church much more than in the past. The financial changes that we instituted during this period helped us weather this time to the best of our ability. For your support of these changes as well as your financial support during these past nineteen months, we extend our sincere appreciation on behalf of the Congregational Council along with the Finance Committee.

As I look into the future, especially the next two months, I am required as your Treasurer to share with you the current financial status of our Church. As far as expenses, most of our expenses are in line with budgets that were approved at the Annual Congregational Meeting earlier this year. As far as our income, we need to be most grateful to the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy program that continued to offset some of our salary expenses with these Grant funds totalling \$18,650.00.

However, this program is coming to an end shortly. In addition, our rental income for both our building and our parking lot across the street from the Church increased dramatically over this income in the past. As I write this letter, the combined rental income this year is \$15,450.00 versus \$4,450.00 last year, an increase of \$11,000.00. The increase in the building rental is due in a large part to our rental agreement with Avon Mennonite Church. This arrangement is working well and an excellent opportunity for us to share our building with our brothers and sisters at Avon Mennonite Church. But even with this combined income, Zion's Current Fund has a deficit balance of \$45,779.12 as of September 30<sup>th</sup>. Therefore, having shared this information with you, each member is being asked to assist in whatever way you are able to help eliminate this shortfall over the next two months.

We ask that you prayerfully consider our request of helping to eliminate the shortfall by year end and responding as you are able. A special envelope marked "Current Fund Deficit" is enclosed for your use in making an offering to decrease Zion's deficit.

Thank you for your continuing faithfulness to the ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ here at Zion Lutheran Church.
