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PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

"And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias, and he was added to the eleven disciples." – Acts 1:26.



Every Sunday, my parents and I would take our place in the pews in St. Peter's Lutheran Church in North Plainfield, New Jersey. While I was mostly attentive to the service, I must admit that there were times when my attention wandered, and I would often find myself staring at the stained-glass windows that surrounded our sanctuary. The windows featured many persons and stories from the Bible; at the bottom of each

window was a dedication to the person for whom the window was donated. Some of the names were familiar, since many families had worshipped at St. Peter's for generations; but some names were completely unfamiliar to me. All I knew was that they were very special to their loved ones, and people who played an important role in the life and ministry of the congregation where I was baptized, confirmed, ordained, and taught about the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Many of the congregations that I have served as pastor (including Zion) have stained-glass windows in their sanctuaries, windows that are also dedicated to the memory of loved ones and saints who from their labours rest. While my attention during worship is focussed on leading the service and preaching, there are other times during the week when I walk around the sanctuary and look at the names on these windows. As was true in my home congregation, some of the names I recognize from families who are still in our congregation; but other names are unfamiliar to me. What I know about these "unknown saints" is that they played an important role in the ministry of the congregation where we gather for worship surrounded by their names, and that they are among the saints for whom we give thanks even if their names are unknown to us.

On May 14, the church gives thanks for the life of St. Matthias, an apostle of Jesus Christ who is only mentioned in one place in the New Testament. In the ten days between the Ascension of Jesus and the day of Pentecost, the disciples need to decide who will replace Judas Iscariot among the Twelve. The position vacated by Judas' death had to be filled because the apostolic number twelve is symbolic of the restored faithful Israel (which was made up of twelve tribes that were descended from the twelve sons of Jacob). By initiating and leading the community's restoration of the original number of the Twelve, Peter fulfills Jesus' command to "strengthen your brothers" (Luke 22:32). Judas' replacement had to meet one important criterion: to be a witness to Jesus' resurrection the candidate must have "accompanied us the whole time the Lord Jesus came and went among us" (Acts 1:21). The community proposes to candidates for this position: Joseph called Barsabbas and Matthias. They prayed to Jesus to "show which one of these two you have chosen" (1:24). Then they cast lots, a biblical method of seeking God's Will, "and the lot fell upon Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles." (1:26). Matthias, who unlike Judas was a witness to the resurrection of Jesus Christ, "represents a repentant Israel in whose life God's reign is present through the gift of the Holy Spirit." (Robert W. Wall).

Matthias is never again mentioned by name in the New Testament, but he was among the apostles who received the gift of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost "and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." (Acts 2:4). Legends and traditions tell stories of his apostolic ministry, and he is remembered as a martyr who gave his life for his witness to the Gospel; but there is no evidence to back up any of these stories. But even if his name fades from the biblical witness, he is one of the countless disciples of Christ in every generation whose names have been forgotten but whose legacy lives on in the continuing life of the Church and our mission to be the "one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church" (Nicene Creed) that continues the work begun among the first apostles to "proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light." (1 Peter 2:9). According to Clement of Alexandria, Matthias was chosen like all disciples of Jesus not because of who he already was, but for what Jesus foresaw he would become. Matthias was elected an apostle not because he was worthy, but because he would become worthy. Matthias was chosen by God who is "the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, in order that, as it is written, 'Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord.'" (1 Corinthians 1:30).

Most of us will end up like many of people listed on the stained-glass windows in numerous churches, persons whose names are forgotten like Matthias' name is never again mentioned in the Bible. But while we may not remember their names, we give thanks for their faithfulness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ in their generation, and for laying the foundation

upon which our church and its witness has been built. We may be listed one day with Matthias among the 'unknown saints," but we continue to strive as he and so many Christians have been faithful to their callings to "be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labour is not in vain." (1 Corinthians 15:58).


INTRODUCING CHAIR YOGA


