PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

"In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." – Matthew 5:16

Among the many faithful, dedicated Christians I have been privileged to serve with during my many years of ordained ministry was Gordon.

Gordon was not a person you might notice even if you were a faithful member of his congregation; he shunned the spotlight, rarely speaking in meetings or leading public worship. Gordon was a person whose ministry happened behind the scenes, out of sight of most people in the church and community. Gordon was usually the first person in the building on Sunday mornings; he would make certain that the lights were on, and the heat was working, would check that all the doors were opened, and would prepare the coffee for fellowship time after worship. There were mornings when I did not even know he was in the building until he stopped by and wished me a good morning as I was preparing my worship notes. Few people noticed Gordon or the many tasks he performed on Sundays, but without him the worship life of the congregation would have been far more challenging.

Over my time in the community, I would run into Gordon continuing his faithful, behind the scenes ministry in many places. One day, I met him at the hospital where he had driven a neighbour for a medical appointment. Gordon and his wife delivered Meals on Wheels daily, and he would often take people shopping or help them care for their homes and lawns. When I would thank Gordon for his faithfulness and many acts of kindness, he would simply reply, "I'm just doing what Jesus wants me to do, and for God to get all the glory."

This month, the church remembers a saint who in many ways exemplified Gordon's approach to living his baptismal life out of the limelight so that God was given all the glory. On May 14, we remember Matthias the Apostle, one of the most obscure saints of the early church.

The only place where he appears in the New Testament is in the first chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, where he is one of two candidates to take the place of Judas Iscariot among the twelve disciples as they await the empowerment of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost:

• "So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us – one of these must become a witness with us to the resurrection.' So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, 'Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place.' And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias, and he was added to the eleven apostles." – Acts 1:21-26.

This is the first and last time we hear of Matthias in the Bible. While his fellow apostles — especially Peter, John, and Paul — play a prominent role in the story of the apostolic mission of the church, nothing is said of Matthias or his ministry. Some traditions outside of Scripture say that Matthias planted the faith around Cappadocia and around the Caspian Sea; other traditions state that he preached the Gospel in Judea and Aethiopia and was crucified; there is even a marker in modern-day Georgia that claims that Matthias is buried at that site. But in truth, it does not matter whether or not we know what happened to Matthias or the details of his ministry; we do know that he was one of the many faithful Christians who played an indispensable role in the spread of the Gospel to the ends of the earth, one of the many disciples of Christ whose names have been lost in history but played a part in passing down the liberating Word of God so that we might have this blessed hope that gives us strength and confidence in the most difficult circumstances we may encounter. We may not remember their names or know their stories, but they were among the faithful who shared the light of Christ during their lives so that we might have this blessed hope to share with those we are called among to live and serve.

I lost contact with Gordon after I moved on from that call. Chances are that Gordon has died, and his name and legacy may well have been forgotten; but his life was a living testimony to what it means to shine the light of Christ before others not for one's own self-aggrandizement but so that when others see the good works we do in Christ's name, they may give glory not to us but to the Lord whose light shines before us and gives us the promise of strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow. As we remember St. Matthias, the "apostle of the unknown saints," may we give thanks to God for faithful disciples like Gordon, and may we strive to serve so that we do not call attention to ourselves but to the one who died and rose again so that we might live in the promise of a blessed life today even as we look to the promise

of the life that is to come. May we – like the unknown saints then and now – strive in all our words and deeds to live by the motto *Soli Deo Gloria* – "To God alone be the glory!"

ROTARY HOSPICE has a volunteer who makes lightly scented candles using tea cups and saucers which hold the wax. They are looking for donations of tea cups and saucers to use in the making of these candles. The Director of Music at the time, namely, Ian Sadler was very involved with the acquisition of the pipe organ and we are indebted to Ian for all his involvement and expertise in bringing this project to a successful conclusion.




INTRODUCING OUR PIPE ORGAN

The organ is a 32 stop, 3 manual, 1954 Casavant pipe organ, opus 2219. This instrument was custom built for the chapel of the Franciscan Fathers of the Noviciate of Holy Name in Lafayette, New Jersey. In 1979 the order was dissolved and the complex was sold to the Sunrise House Foundation where people could come for drug and alcohol rehabilitation. In the fall of 1999 the organ was advertised for sale and was purchased for Zion Lutheran Church in Stratford. The firm of Dodington and Dodington Pipe Organ Services Inc., district representatives for Casavant Frère took responsibility for the removal, transportation and installation here in Zion. The facade from a previous Karn pipe organ is connected to the Casavant organ. These pipes face the sanctuary on the right side. The Organ chamber has been enlarged to twice the size of the original space to accommodate the pipes and mechanisms. The organ has 32 stops, 39 ranks, and 2,391 pipes.

The people primarily responsible for the installation work include: Ross Dodington, Jim Dodington, Mark James, George Veltman, and Linda Dodington. We thank them for all their hard work, patience, understanding and care during the construction period.
