

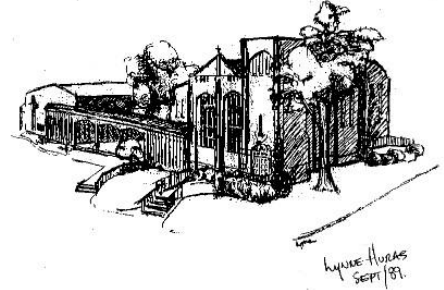

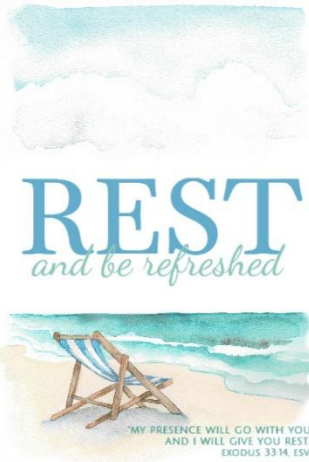
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PASTOR'S DEVOTIONAL

“Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.” – Mark 6:31.



For many years, a large rock had a prominent place on my desk. It was an ordinary rock that had no monetary value but had great value to me because it came from my favourite childhood place to go in the summer, my aunt and uncle's cottage on Culver Lake. To me, Culver Lake was a magical place where I could go swimming, canoeing, fishing, and soaking up the sun along the pristine shores of that northern New Jersey lake. When summer arrived, I would count the days until we would pack the car and head north, stopping at favourite places along the way until we turned onto Lakeshore Drive and I caught my first glimpse of the lake's glistening waters. It was during one of those trips that I found my rock and brought it home so that I would always have a reminder of this place where we would spend many relaxing days away from the busyness of everyday being refreshed and renewed by our time in this summertime getaway.

As soon as the May long weekend arrives, many of us turn our thoughts to our favourite summer destinations, places we go to get away from our normal routines to relax and recharge. It may be the family cottage where we have spent summers for generations, or a cabin we rent year after year on the shores of a beautiful lake. It may be taking time to visit with family and friends, occasions when we can tune out the noise of the outside world and focus on the love

and care we share. For some people, getting away does not involve travel but refocusing one's attention to a backyard garden, a neighbourhood swimming pool, or a picnic in the park. However we choose to enjoy these warmer days when the sun stays out longer, we look forward to times when we can put aside the cares and worries of everyday life so that we might enjoy the wonderful places to which we return year after year.

The desire to get away for relaxation and restoration is not only a modern phenomenon but a practice rooted in Scripture. Among the commandments that the Lord gave to the people of Israel on Mount Sinai is the command to "*remember the sabbath day and keep it holy*" (Exodus 20:8). The Third Commandment is based on the account of creation in Genesis when "*in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested on the seventh day; therefore the LORD blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.*" (Exodus 20:11). Observing the Sabbath was to be a defining characteristic of the people of Israel; to this day, observant Jews go to great lengths to make certain that they refrain from any form of labour from sundown Friday to sundown Saturday, observing a day when God commanded the people to rest as God had rested at creation. While some people find the Sabbath commandment restrictive, filled with prohibitions and restrictions, for those who observe the Sabbath faithfully it is a blessing from God in which no person can force another to do any work, because God gave God's people a day to rest and renew themselves for the work they will pursue the other six days of the week.

While the command for Sabbath rest is to be found in both the accounts of creation and the giving of the Torah in the Old Testament, many people resist God's command for us to take time to rest. Many people pride themselves on their busy schedules; a common response to "how are you" in China is to respond, "I am very busy, thank you." We measure our worth by the number of obligations we place upon ourselves, rather than acknowledging that we are human beings who need to rest and renew our strength before we suffer from fatigue and burnout. Clergy are among those most guilty of ignoring the Sabbath command; many of my colleagues often measure our faithfulness by the number of hours we work during the week or by the number of consecutive days we work without a day off. Sadly, ignoring God's invitation to rest often leads to ministries that are less effective and often end too soon. As our Lord invited his disciples to come away and rest with him, we too are called to look upon the Sabbath – be it a day or several days – as necessary moments for us to follow our Lord's example of obtaining balance in our lives, taking time for rest and renewal so that we might resume our lives of witnessing to the love of God in Jesus Christ our Lord.

In a chapter in her book *An Altar in the World* entitled "The Practice of Saying No," Barbara Brown Taylor invites us to reclaim the practice of sabbath both in observance to our Lord's commandment and for the benefits it offers us both physically and spiritually:

- “At least one day in every seven, pull off the road and park the car in the garage. Close the door to the toolshed and turn off the computer. Stay home not because you are sick but because you are well. Take someone you love into being well with you. Take a nap, a walk, an hour for lunch. Test the premise that you are worth more than what you produce – that even if you spent one whole day being good for nothing you would still be precious in God’s sight – and when you get anxious because you are convinced that this is not so, remember that your own conviction is not required. This is a *commandment*. Your worth has already been established, even when you are not working. The purpose of the commandment is to woo you to the same truth.”

The rock from Culver Lake is no longer on my desk (it got lost in one of our moves) but the memory of that magical place where we escaped every summer for rest and refreshment lives on. My aunt and uncle’s cottage no longer exists, but there are now other places where I am invited to go where I might heed our Saviour’s invitation to “*come away ... and rest a while.*” May all of us find times and places for such Sabbath rest, so that we might be renewed in strength and hope to continue to be the people of God who are called to share the light and love of our Lord and Saviour with all the world.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY 20, 2026 CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL MEETING

The May 20, 2026 Congregational Council Meeting was held in-person in the Parlour. A concern was raised to Tom Cosstick, Chairperson of the Property Committee, regarding rodent issues in the church building. Tom advised that this is an old building and that occasionally rodents will come into the building. We do have a Rodent Control Program in place and the records of this Program are kept in the Church Office. All concerns regarding the caretaking of the church should be brought to Tom to be addressed appropriately. It was also suggested that as congregational members we need to be more proactive in keeping our church building tidy. (ie. take a minute to clean up mouse droppings, garbage, cobwebs, etc. when we see them). We need to remember that we are a large and very busy building, and that our caretakers are doing the best that they can in the 25 hours/week time allotment for which they are contracted.

Mike and Sue Weber & Friends will be performing in the sanctuary on May 31. This concert is a fundraiser for the ongoing maintenance of our platform chair lifts.

On May 30 Marco Burak will present the latest of his "Composers in Concert" series in the Sanctuary. This concert includes many guest musicians, including Susan Laustsen who will be singing several of Marco's recent compositions.

Pastor Jeff recently attended the 200th Anniversary of the United Lutheran Seminary.

Our Sunday School had its final class of this school year on Sunday, May 10. On that Sunday we also honoured Paula McNaughton and Karen McLeod as they concluded their service as Sunday School Superintendent and Teacher. Kyla Montgomery will take on the role of Sunday School Superintendent in September.

Pastor Jeff will be taking two one-week trips to the Chautauqua Institution in western New York for vacation this summer: Saturday, July 25 to Saturday, August 1 and Pastor Tim Elliott will lead worship on Sunday, July 26. Pastor Jeff will also be on vacation from Saturday, August 22 to Sunday, August 30. Pastor Tim Elliott will lead worship on Sunday, August 23, and Pastor Jeff will be asking another colleague to lead worship on Sunday, August 30.

Our next coffee hour will be held on Sunday, June 14 and will be sponsored by Isabel Cook and Susan Laustsen.

The Seniors' Luncheon held on May 8 was well attended. Our next Seniors' Luncheon will be on June 12 and will be the last luncheon until the fall.

Tom Cosstick will be meeting with Kel Fraser regarding the paving of the Church parking lot. A quote from three different companies will be obtained. Once the Property Committee selects a company to repave the parking lot, they will present their recommendations to the Endowment Fund Committee. The Endowment Fund Committee will make their recommendation to the Finance Committee and eventually to the Congregational Council. In addition, a Special Congregational Meeting will be scheduled for formal approval, in order to take principal funds from the first Bequest, which will require a 2/3rd approval of the members in attendance at the meeting.

Darrell Rennecker has prepared step by step instructions on how to operate the chair lifts. However it is felt that an in-person training meeting is still required.

WOMEN OF FAITH



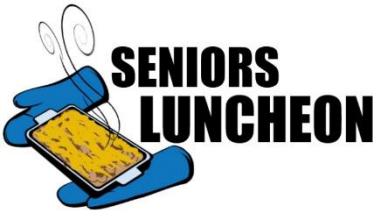
The next meeting of the Women of Faith will be a Luncheon format at the Arden Park Hotel on **June 22nd at 12:30 P.M.**

In the past we have published in the Sunday Bulletin the above poster outlining the services of Shelterlink Youth Services.

Recently I received an email from the Council of Churches sharing a beautiful message from Michelle at Shelterlink. This message included heart warming and encouraging stories she shared of a couple of young people whose lives were positively impacted by the important work of Shelterlink Youth Services. Below are these stories that I thought I would pass along to you.

"At just fourteen years old, I began couch surfing because home was not a safe or stable place for me to live. I was constantly moving between different places, trying to find some sense of stability while still going to school and navigating everyday life on my own.

Over the past few years, Shelterlink Youth Services became one of my biggest supports. They came directly to meet with me at school and in other safe spaces because I did not have transportation and I didn't want to miss school. Shelterlink also worked with me to find my own room to rent when I was ready. They worked with my landlady and helped pay my rent through the Shelterlink Trustee Program. Without their support, I truly believe I may have ended up in CAS care or a shelter long term.

With that stability and support, I was able to start building a future for myself. Over the past year, I have remained housed in a safe and stable home. I was able to access important resources, including financial assistance, complete my income taxes for the first time, and find employment. Having those supports in place allowed me to focus more on finishing high school, activities, and my overall well-being, which is much better.

Shelterlink also helped me gather the documentation I needed to apply for post-secondary education and stayed in regular communication with me throughout the entire process. Because of that support, and the encouragement I received along the way, I will be attending college in September 2026, something that once felt impossible for me." - Charlie 19 years old.

Another great success story and 2026 graduate is Andrea.

"A couple of years ago, things at home got to the point where I couldn't stay there anymore. It wasn't safe or healthy. I didn't really know what to do or where to go, but someone I knew reached out to Ann at Shelterlink Youth Services for help. At the time, everything felt pretty overwhelming. I was trying to figure out housing, school, money, and honestly just how to keep moving forward without giving up.

Since connecting with Shelterlink, a lot has changed for me. I've been able to stay in a home I moved into and finally have some stability in my life. I stayed in school, kept up with my classes, and got involved in school sports again, which made me feel more like myself. I also kept working my part-time job and spending time with my friends instead of feeling isolated all the time. One of the biggest things is that I'm graduating, which is something I'm really proud of because there were times I honestly didn't know if I would make it this far.

Shelterlink helped me in ways that made a real difference day to day. They helped me get on Ontario Works and supported me through the trustee program so I could stay on track financially. They gave me bus passes so I could get to school and work without stressing about transportation. My trustee even meets with me privately at school, which helps because I always know I have someone I can talk to when things get difficult. They also helped me complete housing applications and encouraged me to stay involved in sports and school activities instead of giving up on the things I enjoy."- Andrea 18 years old
